Means, who had been iingering between life and death since fast Enturday night, died Friday afternoon at .1:30, aged 53 years and 20 days. edoctor had suffered a gradual decline since being attacked by Lagrippe last winter. Several weeks ago he went to Buffalo to see advisors eminent in the medical profession; returning he seemed to get along as usual, paying a little atteution to his practice, until last Satarday night. After that he did not speak, except two or three words on Tuesday joke on washday." and Wednesday, two days in which he showed slight signs of improvement. Thursday his attending physicians were satisfied the end was near and Friday it came. Monday, while unable to speak, though in an hour of consciousness, he bid the members of his family farewell, giving expressions by beckoning and pressure of the hand' and his eyes were illled with tears.

Dr. Means was born in Whitesville, Jefferson county. He studied medicine with Dr. Altman, of Punxsutawney and less than a year ago he attended the funeral of his preceptor. The doctor was a graduate of the Cincinnaci medical college and had practiced medicine for twenty-five years; nine years of that time at Luthersburg, four years at Big Run and about twelve years in DuBois. The stamily home is on the corner of Long and Stockdale streets, just a square from the Vosburg corner, where the doctor's office has been located for years. W. A. Means and Mary A. Lewis were macried April, 22, 1858, Mrs. Means survives her busdand and there are also flye-sons and five daughters: Silas W., in Fairhaven. Washington, Maggie, wife of Geo. D. Hamor, Tacoma, Washington, Ed L., of Penfield, Miss Lizzi, James, Mabel. Marl, Euphrasi , Charlie and Bird, all of whom are at home at present except the two in the west.

! Deceased was a member of the Masonic Fraternity, Ancient Order United Workmen and Select Knights of America. He carried a life insurance policy with the Workmen of \$2,000, a policy with the Whights, and \$1,000 with an old line "Company.
